Freshmen who choose to enroll in Advanced English 1 should be enthusiastic about taking a challenging curriculum, love English, and be academically ready to accept the **rigor** of a class that will prepare them for college level studies. Please keep this in mind as you make your enrollment decisions for the coming year. We look forward to meeting you all, and we welcome you to John Swett High School!

The purpose of this summer reading assignment is to help build a foundation for your future explorations of literature. Classical mythology is a major source for most of the literary allusions and recurring themes found in the literature of Western civilization. There are many mythology texts, but Edith Hamilton's *Mythology* is probably the most comprehensive. Please obtain a copy of Edith Hamilton's *Mythology* at your local library or bookstore and read the text in its entirety over the summer. It would be best for you to purchase your own copy so that you can annotate various pages as you see fit, and it is mandatory that you have access to a copy for in-class use (required for every day of this unit).

In addition, you are responsible for completing a dialectical journal for each section of *Mythology*. Instructions for the dialectical journal are included on the back of this sheet. This assignment may be turned in as early as the end of the first week of school, but **will not be accepted after the end of the Greek Mythology unit** (about 3-4 weeks after school has started). This project is meant to prepare you for your Greek Myth Comprehensive Test, scheduled for Friday August 27, 2021 (end of the first week of school), which will be your first major grade of the year. Failure to have a C- by the end of the Greek Myth unit will result in automatic removal from Advanced English 1.

You will have a Socratic Seminar presentation, or two, on the readings from *Mythology* after school begins in the fall. For this reason, we encourage you to be thoughtful in your reading and write adequate notes. Summaries that have been copied from internet sources or from previous students will receive no credit; *be original and concise* in your writing for this dialectical journal. ONLY HANDWRITTEN WORK IS ACCEPTABLE. I will NOT be grading the journals that are typed. NO ADDITIONAL PAGES OF WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED, OTHER THAN THE JOURNAL ITSELF. You will receive credit for neat, organized, thorough, yet concise summaries, so be sure to give your very best effort.

Requirement: Dialectical Journal

For this journal, you will neatly write down concise summaries that are NUMBERED 1-10 for each section of *Mythology* by Edith Wharton. You will need to record at <u>least 2 quotes</u> (minimum 16 quotes total) and their page number(s) in the second column (see example on chart for proper citation). In the third column are Costa Level II Questions. There is a thorough description of these on the charts, but *simply* put, these should be questions that promote good discussions in response to the questions. These should *not* be as simple as, "What are the names of Zeus' children?"; that example of a question would receive NO credit.
